

PRIEST HAS NO 'REGRETS' ABOUT VOCATION - FR. TED GATFIELD, '41

Father Edward Gatfield sat across from me in a room overlooking the mouth of Lake Erie, and smiled when I asked why he ever became a priest.

He thought about it for a moment, shook his head, then began to speculate. It could've been the result of the tragic accidental death of a fellow pilot in training during the Second World War, and how Gatfield was the one chosen to accompany the body of his dead friend back to Windsor to inform the family. Or It could've been his close association with the Knights of Columbus and his desire to help others. Or It could've been the influence of the Basilians from Assumption College where he had gone to school.

But the truth is, Gatfield finally explained, "there wasn't any big explosion from Heaven, or anything like that- I think God just picked me."

A Belief in Faith

As simple as that. A belief in faith. A belief that all of us are led by something more powerful than us. Some call it fate. Others see it as the work of God. For this 83-year-old priest from Amherstburg, it was the latter: a means of putting one's faith into a decision that would make it the right choice. "I have no regrets," says Gatfield. "I'm happy I became a priest." On that day in June, 1955 when he joined 21 classmates at St. Peter's Seminary to be ordained, Gatfield had a sense of calmness and confidence in where this choice would lead him. "I thought this was a beautiful way to spend the rest of my life - doing things for others. I thought, 'Gosh, I'm a lucky guy.'"

His work for the London Diocese took him to Windsor shortly after ordination. He served in a number of positions, and at a few churches and retreat centers. Gatfield was at St. Clare's before being sent to Holy Cross Retreat House where he remained for five years. He was finally sent to Harrow's St. Anthony's where he stayed for 17 years. Unlike many who became priests in the 1950s, Gatfield didn't spring right out of high school. He had already received a B. A. through the University of Western Ontario. He had also signed up to fight in the Second World War and did "commando" training. "I could eat nails," he said sarcastically. But after the war, Gatfield was in no hurry to rush into the church. He opened a photography business with a friend. "I didn't know anything about it. I was still going to school, but we figured we could do this. And we did."

Life-Altering Change

They specialized in candid photography but by 1949 Gatfield decided it was time to make that life-altering change. "In looking back at that time, you would think there had to be something that made this happen. But I'm still not sure." In any case, June 5th, Gatfield celebrated his 1965 ordination at St. John the

Baptist Church here. In the 50 years he has served as a priest. Gatfield doesn't shy away from talking about the sexual abuse scandals that have rocked his church. "There's no defence." he says matter-of-factly but with obvious sadness. "We have all suffered fiercely because of it. We're all tainted." As far as the controversy over the election of right-wing theologian Cardinal Ratzinger as Pope Benedict XVI, Gatfield figures on living long enough to prove all the nay sayers are wrong about him. "Give me an intellectual any time," said the elderly Amherstburg priest. He maintains that the turmoil in the church today is "a good sign" that change is going to happen. And it'll be a change we need, one that will heal wounds and usher in "renewal in the Church." Gatfield adds. This kindly, more liberal-minded priest predicts Pope Benedict will seize the challenge that faces the modern church, and affect change that will be good to everyone. "Of course, I just have to live long enough to see this happen." Gatfield says with a smile.



DR. CARMAN IANNICELLO '68, HE'S SO VEIN

In December 2004, Dr. Carman lannicello, '68, was featured in The Windsor Star. He and Dr. M. Ristic established the Windsor Vein Centre to provide comprehensive evaluation and treatment for a large number of people who suffer from different forms of varicose and spider veins. "It's a genetic thing. Ninety percent of the time, varicose veins are inherited. It's a defective gene. The defect may be stronger in some people than in others, but it's still there, and you can't alter genetics. We're trying to, but we're not there yet," says vascular surgeon Dr. Carman lannicello. "Women are 10 to 15 times more likely to have "bad veins" than men because of several reasons. But the good news - yes, there is some - is that you can get rid of the abnormal veins using several different procedures, and you can also reduce your risk factors for creating new ones." The newest treatment for those big, deep veins that hurt so much is called "endovenous radio frequency obliteration", and the Vein Treatment Centre is the only place in Canada where you can have it done. lannicello and his colleagues have been doing it for more than a year and a half without much fanfare, and clients like the fact there's no anesthetic involved and even better, no pain. "Actually, lannicello is always looking for new ways to deal with a problem that plagues millions of men and women, especially between the ages of 30 and 60. The newest radio frequency technique is one of the most promising, with an 85-95 percent success rate at six years. The more invasive surgery, by comparison, is 60 percent effective after six years. There's no guarantee you won't create some new varicose veins along the way. That, says lannicello, all goes back to genetics, with a smattering of lifestyle thrown in." The Windsor Vein Centre is located at 880 North Service Road, Building 300, and telephone (519) 250-4286.

He began a career with the Separate School Board in Sept. 1964 as a teacher for over 20 years at H.J. Ed retired from St. Alexander school seven years ago after a rewarding and innovative career spanning 35 years.

Nespolon '60 named "Cartoonist of the Year" by OCNA

Local cartoonist's work appears in each issue of Shoreline Week

Editorial cartoonist Tony Nespolon '60 has drawn attention from the Ontario Community Newspaper Association for his biting commentary using pen and ink. Nespolon, whose work appears in each issue of Shoreline Week, was recently named "Cartoonist of the Year" in the OCNA's 2001 Better Newspapers Competition.

Rebecca Ryane, associate editor of one of our sister publications, the LaSalle Post, submitted one of Nespolon's cartoons for the competition. The winning cartoon, entitled "A Pie in the Sky Gondola", was one of 31 entries received and featured the noble idea of linking Detroit with Windsor with a gondola system.

The OCNA wasn't the only group to honour Nespolon for the award. Earlier at a LaSalle Town Council meeting, Nespolon received his plaque and a medal in recognition of his achievement. Nespolon has been drawing editorial cartoons

since 1997. His work focuses mainly on satirical images of local politicians. Thanks to his style and word of mouth, his work has drawn attention throughout southwestern Ontario. His cartoons can be seen in 12 publications, including Shoreline Week.

A retired teacher with the Greater Essex County District School Board, Nespolon taught both English and Art. Since retirement, he has continued to remain active in his community and keeps his interest in art alive with his editorial cartoons.

Nespolon remembers travelling to Italy and sketching what he saw. He recalls of his early days as a hobby artist.

Today, give him a story line and he'll come up with an 'appropriate drawing.'

"I really enjoy satirizing politicians," he explains.

Satire comes easy for Nespolon. The hard part, he says, is researching "hot topics" in the news.

Those selections of "hot topics" have paid off with this most recent honour. However, this is not his

first brush with the OCNA awards. In 1999, he won the award for "Best Local Cartoon". The enduring picture of Mayor Mike Hurst as a hungry dragon and Warden Pat O'Neil as a gladiator ripped from the annexation fight between the City of Windsor and the County of Essex.

"This is not just an editorial cartoon, it's entertainment! commented OCNA judge Bob Muirhead.

Nespolon continues to concoct editorial cartoons in his home and says he will continue with the folk art that serves as therapy.

Nespolon says that there are two quotes he admires and tries to follow when drawing: "What you really want is a cartoonist that makes you nervous," from Halifax editor Bill Turpin and "La bete d'humanite ... not owned by one political party" from Montreal La Presse's Serge Chapleau.

RYAN PERROTTE, '95 GUEST SPEAKER

Ryan Perrotte of the class of 1995 was the guest speaker at the 134th Commencement Exercises on Tuesday, June 28th for the 2005 Graduating Class of Assumption College School.

During Ryan's years at Assumption, he excelled at basketball and volleyball, winning many championships and being part of many All City teams. He won a full scholarship to IPFW (Indiana Perdu at Fort Wayne). He returned to IPFW recently as the assistant coach of the men's volleyball team. A former four-year starter for the Mastodons. Perrotte presently holds the block assist record at IPFW with 429. He is also the current record holder for highest hitting percentage in a match (.850 vs. Ohio State. 1999). Perrotte played an integral role for the team that won the MIVA championship and participated in the 1999 NCAA Final Four at UCLA. That same year. he was selected MIVA All-Conference Second Team. In his four-year playing career for IPFW. Perrotte helped the Mastodons amass a 67-33 record. Since 1999, Perrotte has been a broadcaster with College Access Channel 56, providing outstanding play-byplay and insightful colour commentary for various IPFW athletic events. Perrotte received a bachelor's degree in business accounting, and just recently completed his master's degree in communication.

At the graduating ceremonies, Ryan emphasized to the graduates that he doesn't measure success in life by the position he has attained in it, but rather he measures it by the obstacles which he has overcome while trying to succeed.

Here are some excerpts of his speech to the Assumption graduates of 2005: I cannot believe that it has been ten years since I graduated from Assumption. And really, when I think about it, a lot has changed since I first attended Assumption some fifteen years ago. Things were so different then. You

know how different it was? The Canadian dollar was flourishing above 80 cents, the Canadian government was at a political deadlock, Bush was president and the U.S. just finished a war with Iraq. Isn't that amazing? Wow, things have changed.

Honourable Mary Margaret Parent, Members of the Assumption Graduation Committee, the Basilian Fathers, the graduating class of 2005, distinguished guests of yours, staff and administration, ladies and gentlemen, I am truly delighted and honoured to be the special commencement speaker this evening.

Greatest Achievement?

There is a saying that goes: the greatest achievement of the graduate is sitting through the commencement address. It's not at all hard for me to remember that vivid day of my own graduation exactly ten years ago. Strangely enough, the two things about that day that I cannot remember are, who the commencement speaker was, and what the commencement speaker had to say. My thoughts, like you, were targeted upon my family and my friends and my plans for the summer.

When I was asked back in April to provide an inspiring, inviting, and invigorating speech to you, the 2005 graduating class of Assumption, I was very hesitant because I thought that I really didn't have any magical words to motivate you about entering the next phase of your life, whatever that may be: whether college, university, the working world, whatever.

"Never, Never, Never give up!"

Initially, I thought that maybe I should just come up here and say those magical "Winston Churchill" words, when he was asked to give the commencement address at Oxford University decades ago -"Never, Never, Never give up!" So I thought about it for awhile, and then realized that the answer to my vexing issue was right in front of my face. I am constantly berated by the question: How did you become so successful in life? Great question. However, unlike many people, I do not measure my success in life by the position I have attained in it. Instead. I measure success in this fashion, as described perfectly in this quote by Booker T. Washington: 'Success is to be measured not so much by the position that one has reached in life as by the obstacles which she or he has overcome while trying to succeed.' But how do we overcome these barriers to reach that sought after position in life? The answer to this question, as I have just recently discovered, has provided me the foundation with which I've become successful in life. Simultaneously, the answer to this question has also been before each one of you during your tenure at Assumption College School, and is now the foundation for which each one of you can build upon as you enter the next phase of your life.

The answer is this: Bonitatem et Disciplinam et Scientiam doce me.

Teach me Goodness, Discipline and Knowledge, Assumption's motto.

... Your achievements during the past several years have been nothing less than extraordinary. Your outstanding scholastic achievement today brings forth responsibility and a civic duty to now enter a new phase of your life with the constant reminder that anything is possible, no matter how great the odds. Follow your dreams, follow your heart, follow the Holy Spirit. Let your soul be your pilot on the journey of life. My dream to you as leaders of tomorrow, as people who will be in positions to make decisions of consequence, is to allow morality and a sense of fundamental concern for humanity guide your decisions. You are the products of greatness.

Through your hard work, sacrifice, faith, the making of good choices, with the support of family, friends and teachers, you have all succeeded. During your time in high school, some of you have experienced great obstacles along the road to graduation. Through it all, you've managed to overcome them. Through the virtues of Goodness, Discipline and Knowledge, your experience here at Assumption has prepared each one of you for the next chapter in your lives.







Remember When?

1954-1955

(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')

High school enrolment was 838 students, of whom 187 were boarders. Fees for Grade 9 were set at \$105 while those for the remaining grades were \$115. Room and board was pegged at \$610. Work was progressing at full throttle on the new high school: "the architect is working on the plans for the first wing of the new high school. It is hoped that it will be ready in September [1955]".

In the winter, the Junior Basketball team won W.O.S.S.A. under the tutelage of Reno Bertoia, who came home to Assumption to garner his first coaching title. But the story of the year was again the Senior Hockey team as they went on to gain their fifth straight W.S.S.A. and third

W.O.S.S.A. title in five years. In that five-year period, the Raiders record was 76-6-4. During the season, they won their 18 starts, and outscored the opposition 113-23.

Activities for the year included Student Council, the Social Committee, Weight Lifters, the St. John Bosco Club, the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin, the Young Christian Students, the Legion of Mary, the Mission Society, the Band, The Crusader, the Reporter, the Drama Club (which staged "See How They Run", "Monkey's Paw", "Home Sweet Home", and "Arsenic and Old Lace"),

the Hobby Club, the Checker Club, the Canadian and American Moms Club, the Dads Club (which packed 1200 people into the gym for a fund raising bingo), the Sea Cadets (only the second Sea Cadets Corps in Canada), and the Oratorical Club (which entered the first ever International Basilian Speech Festival in Toronto). The year also marked the first canned good drive in Assumption's history.

In the spring came the news about the start of construction of Assumption's own high school up on Huron Line. The Reporter noted: The plans are set, the sod has been turned and headway is being made in the building of the new school. However, this undertaking will be done in stages. The first stage will involve the moving of only the ninth and tenth grades. It will be a one-storey building consisting of [the] first ten classrooms. There will be accommodations for a library, offices, activity rooms and locker rooms. Consequently in the new school there will be no lockers in the corridors, but they will be situated in a separate room. Space for a cafeteria has also been made and at one end of it will be a stage which will later open into the gym. The first stage is expected to be ready for next September.

The gym is part of the second stage and will go up as soon as possible. Also included in this operation is the addition of fifteen more classrooms. With the completion of this phase the remaining grades are expected to move into the new school.

In the third and final stage there will be erected a staff residence and chapel. This will complete the operation and it is hoped that this will be accomplished in the very near future. The buildings will occupy a portion of the capacious twenty-three acre property between Tecumseh Road and College Street.

1969-1970

(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')

This year marked the Centennial of Assumption and the last year of all young men!. Some 781 students were enroled of which 145 were boarders (a decrease of 20% over the previous year). The boarders paid \$1700 for their room and board, the senior day students paid \$240 a year and the juniors (grades 9 and 10) paid nothing. The Basilian Fathers sold about 5 acres of land to the Separate School Board. The funds realized by the sale allowed the renovation of the building which was to become a co-educational senior school by Sept. 1971. Fr. Sheedy stated, "We have decided to make a giant step forward... as an example to the rest of the province as to what can be done in faith and hope... Assumption will more or less "fill the void" left by the closing of St.

Mary's Academy, providing Christian education for the girls of the west side of Windsor."

Grades 9 and 10 fell under the Separate School Board, receiving only elementary school level grants with the Basilian Fathers having complete direction. Grades 11,12 and 13 would still remain private grades paying tuition until the government comes through and removes 'the financial barrier'. The teaching staff would be comprised of the Basilian Fathers, the Holy Names Sisters, Christian Brothers and a reg-



ular staff of lay teachers.

Championships attained included: Ed Petryshyn's Junior Varsity Basketball team winning both W.S.S.A. and S.W.O.S.S.A., Fr. Cullen's hockey team winning W.S.S.A., tennis team of the Galambos brothers (Steve and Nick) taking both W.S.S.A. and S.W.O.S.S.A., and the golf team took S.W.O.S.S.A. At the sports banquet, where Notre Dame's leg-

endary coach Ara
Parseghian was
guest speaker, Mike
Naughton was

became the first
recipient of the Fr.

Around the school, a wide variety of activ-

ities were accomplished including, the staging of 'Music Man', 'Royal Hunt of the Sun' and 'Barefoot in the Park"; the Mission Society, Bookfair, a Grub Day, Activity day, Academic Assembly, Can Drive (56,183 cans), Pep Assemblies, Poster Club, Art Club, Chess Club, Crusader, Reporter, Boarder Parents Club, Mothers Club, Darkroom Club, Library Club, Oratorical Club and Math Contests.

MEMORIES

1974-1975

(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')



The school's population continued to rise this year, reaching 1,659 in total, an increase of 8.4% over the previous year. Tuition for senior level students was \$335; while room and board fees reached \$1600. There were 401 freshmen and 125 boarders.

Principal Father Pat Lalonde utilized the talents of a staff of 92 members this year. By year-end, their efforts had led to the graduation of 297 new Assumption grads.

In his annual report, Father Lalonde noted that the school was able to

handle the increased number of students on site by dividing the Boarders Rec. Hall into five different classrooms. He added that \$1200/month rent was received from the Windsor Separate School Board for use of the facilities. His words describe the crunch that was being felt at the time:

....Our Math Department uses the Rec. Hall and seems delighted with the situation....Our teachers seem willing to do anything to make the school run better....The total financial picture is becoming more and more acute as the cost of education rises and the number of Basilians and Sisters dwindles....We will raise the tuition from \$335 to \$400 for the year 1975-76. We hope this will not turn too many students away. I would not want our school to become one that only the rich could afford...

The following sports teams garnered championships for the Purple Raiders athletic program of 74-75: W.S.S.A. titles to Sister Gloria Drouillard's Junior Girls Basketball squad, Mr. Paolini's Freshmen Boys Basketball, and the Girls Curling team. A S.W.O.S.S.A. title was obtained by the Junior Boys Volleyball team (coached by Mr. Renaud) and the Varsity Hockey team, coached by Father Cullen and Ken Billey, which went on to be All-Ontario finalists. Athletes of the Year were Mark Philp and Angie MacDonald, the latter for a third straight year. Mike Morencie and Cathy Miles were Student Athletes of the Year.

School activities included Student Council, Awards Assembly, Grade 13 Dinner Dance, the Christmas Prom and the Senior Prom, the drama students staged "Mame", "Our Town", and a series of "One Act, Plays", the Sports Banquet, Variety Night, the Darkroom Club, Missions, Can Drive, Handicrafts, Hockey Video production, an Activity Day, The Crusader, the Junior Band, the Pep Band, the Concert Band, Ski Club, Poster Club, Outdoors Club, Reach for the Top, Chess Club, Math Contestants and Assumption's first radio station, C.A.C.H. Radio. The Mothers Club, Dads Club and Boarder Parents Club continued their inestimable work in help-

ing the school. Another Canadian Constitutional Conference was organized and run by the History Department.

1979-1980


(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')

There were 1820 students registered at the College for this academic year, of whom 100 were boarders. Tuition for Grades 11-13 was \$500; while boarders paid \$2700. The school was so overcrowded that two additional classrooms were created by moving lockers into the corridors.

Father Frank McCabe returned for his second year as Principal, with a staff of 106 priests, nuns and lay personnel. A total of 319 graduates became Assumption alumni as they received their graduation diplomas in June.

Assumption athletes were prominent in their successes during this academic year. S.W.O.S.S.A. Championships were won by the following teams: Mr. Owen's Wrestling team (for the third straight year). Junior Girls Cross Country, and Midget Boys, and Junior and Senior Girls Track and Field Teams. As well, the Midget Boys went on to become the Ontario champs! W.S.S.A. titles went to Junior Football, Badminton, and Senior A Boys Basketball, as well as Sue Montbleau's Junior Girls Basketball squad, and Father Cullen's Hockey team. At the Sports Banquet, Dave Binder and Denise Tower were given Athlete of the Year Awards, while Steve Ratko and Eva Freisinger were noted as Student Athletes of the Year.

Around the school: Father Armstrong's Mission Society received \$8269.54 in donations. The Can Drive pulled in 27,000 cans. Other activities included The Crusader, and the work of its photographers; Reach for the Top, a United Nations Conference, Student Council, the Awards Assembly, the Student Concert Band which won the Centennial Music Festival, the Stage Band, the Pep Band, the Assumption Singers and the Junior Band. Mr. Stephens' dramatists put on the play "Man of La Mancha" and a later series of five one act plays. There was a Bowling League, an Italian Club, an exchange with students from Quebec, Chess Club, Oratorical Club, Math Contestants, Radio CACH, and the work of the Dads Club and the Mothers Club, with the Spring Fair and the Fashion Show.



1984-1985

(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')



Enrollment was up by 10% this year, reaching a new all-time high of 1920 students of which 498

were grade nines and only 96 boarders. Tuition at the senior level was \$720. The greatest change that occurred at Assumption happened when Norfolk Campus opened as an annex for the overcrowded conditions as a one year arrangement until the third Catholic high school opened (Holy Names High school with Fr. Hod Marshall as its first principal). Ten of Assumption's feeder schools have been transferred to the new school. The long range projection for Assumption is a population of 1100-1200 students by 1988 (the original population when the school became coed in 1971). Because of the size of the student body and the fact that there were two campuses, there were two starting times. The seniors' schedule went from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. and the juniors' went from 9:10 a.m. until 3:10 p.m. The Grad 9 and 11 students were bussed to the Norfolk Campus (i.e. the former St. Hubert's School on California St.) brought back for lunch, and then finished the day at Assumption.

Only two championship teams graced the school's athletic history, the Junior Girls' Basketball team as City Champs (coaches Miss Boretsky and Mr. Fera), and Mr. Hogan's Freshmen Boys' basketball which garnered a W.S.S.A. title for the fifth consecutive year.

In extra curriculars, the Student Council continued its hard work to develop school spirit. The Assumption Players put on two shows: 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dream Coat' and 'David and Lisa'. Other activities included: the Blood Drive, Can Drive, the work of the Senior Band, Stage Band, Quintet and One, Pep Band, Choral Group, E.C.K.O., Chess team, Computer team, Reach for the Top, Prom Committee, Italian Club, Mothers' Club Spring Fair, Fashion Show, Dads' Club, Play day, Academic Awards Assembly, Father Q's Trips, Gr. 13 Dinner Dance, Newspaper the Grapevine, the Crusader, Cheerleaders and finally, a Gr. 13 vs Teachers basketball game.

Other changes included Fr. Larry Finke becoming the new Dean of Residence and using lay dons to replace priest prefects on the second and third floors of the boarders' residence.

The most far reaching announcement of the year came from Tory Premier William Davis, who initiated the continuation of funding for Grades 11 and 12 to be inaugurated in September 1985. This would have massive implications for all Catholic high schools in the province, Assumption being one of them...

1989-1990

(excerpts taken from John Kelly's history 'Assumption High School 1870-1995')

The writer for the Basilian Annals succinctly commented for this year:

Since the Windsor Separate School Board has assumed control and management of the school, the number of Basilians working within it has decreased, and the work done by the Basilians in residence has assumed a much larger spectrum....

Some familiar faces had gone. Father David Weise, the Chaplain, had been transferred away. Father Vincent Pare had retired. Father Hod Marshall had resigned and was taking an apostolate in St. Lucia in the West Indies. But Father Armstrong continued to raise monies for the Missions and Father Agius did maintenance work at the school. Father Cullen supervised the Alumni and did some hockey and baseball coaching. Father Hart (Vice Principal), Father Stortz (Guidance Head), Father Janisse (Resource Centre) and Father Johnson (Biology) continued active in the school.

...Renovations of the chapel, including the new window and new furnishings were completed in November 1989.... Discussion with the City of Windsor were ongoing for the proposed widening of Huron Church Road, which would include an additional two lanes on the school side of the street. Father Joe Redican C.S.B. began his second year as the school's Principal. His staff for the year numbered one hundred comprised of five Basilians and lay teachers. There were 216 graduates in the class of 1990 who went forth with their Assumption diplomas. Several deaths caused sadness in the school community this year. The greatest outpouring of love and affection occurred upon the passing of Father Leon Hart C.S.B., who had been at the school as Academic Vice Principal (1974-1984) and Vice Principal of Discipline (1984-1990), and who died on January 28, 1990. In fact, the school newspaper The Grapevine, published a "Father Hart Memorial", which, in itself spoke volumes about the many lives he touched while at Assumption.

Other deaths included Mr. Bob Lariviere, a custodian at the school for five years and Joseph MacMillan, an Assumption student for four years, who died at age 18 of bone cancer.

For one of the few years in the school's history, there were no athletic championships claimed. Most Valuable Athlete Awards were given to Jeff Grail and Laura Lapine while Joe Barile and Tina Nikitiuk were recognized as top Student Athletes.

Other school activities included: Academic Awards Assembly, the Blood Drive, Talent Show, Christmas Concert, Annual Canned Food Drive (42,284 cans), the Christmas Float, Q-Trips, French Oratory Contest, Student Council, Debating Team, School Reach Team, Crusader, Students Against Drunk Driving, the Grapevine, Italian Club, Science Olympiad, Peer Helping, newly named Parents' Club (which restarted the Fashion Show), Assumption Players (put on 'Sometimes I Wake Up in The Middle of the

Night', and Campus Ministry and its retreats.

The Bingo Club donated \$10,000 during the year for renovations to the cafeteria, books for the Resource Centre and tech programs.



Student Just Spoke His Mind

Windsor Star by Jordan Press, July 19, 2005.

On the road to becoming valedictorian at Assumption Secondary School, Bob Tran had to give a speech to his classmates. While the other 14 students nominated for the position had the same messages in their speeches, Tran said he did something different, "I just kind of tried talking to the crowd instead of speaking to them." the 18-year-old said. "I just spoke my mind. I actually didn't have anything written down." After that, he was the one chosen to be valedictorian and give the final address at the school's graduation on June 28th. While maintaining an 87 per cent average, he also played volleyball, was a sprinter on the track and field team, a member of student council, part of the multicultural club and helped out each year with the school's canned food drive. On a rainy night during first semester, Bob Tran showed up at school around 5 p.m. to help in Assumption's final push in its

annual canned food drive. He and other students had teachers drive them to an area of the city that had not already been covered. The students went door-to-door asking people to donate their "can goods for charity." Tran did that for six hours. By the end of the night, the school had broken its previous record set the year before. (46,000 cans with an average of over 63 per student). It's a memory, Tran said, that shows him how all the students at the school could come together to help others. Next year, Tran will be back at Assumption to gain the six credits he needs to attend university. He had planned to go to college, but changed his mind after taking college-stream courses. Eventually, he wants to study human kinetics at the University of Windsor. It wasn't something he wanted to study originally but after taking an exercise science course at school this year. Tran said he became interested in the human body and wanted to study it.

Lynn - 1985 works for The Windsor School Board as a custodian at St. John Vianney and L.A. Desmarais Schools.


