

REFEREE CALLS A S HE SEES IT



SISCO His yearbook describes him as Sagacious Sam: all 'A' student, puts a load of effort into everything except getting out of bed, active in intramural sports, likes to argue, with the teachers . . . wields a mean hockey stick." In 2009 Sam Sisco was inducted into the Windsor/Essex

County Sports Hall of Fame along with long-time friends and acquaintances Mark Renaud, Lou Veres and Brad Smith. It was Knobby Knudsen '50, who had nominated Sam for the Hall of Fame honours. As a referee, he had worked games from local minor ranks to the OHA Junior A, OCAA, OUAA, NCAA, and IHL ranks. He refereed for 17 years at the IHL level and was invited by the United States Hockey Association to work the gold medal game between the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia in the 1974 World Cup. It is interesting to note that this Russian team was the same Red Army Team that played in the 1972 Summit Series – with such familiar names as Tretiak, Kharlamov and Alexandrov.

SAM

In his acceptance speech, Sam said, "I'll do my best. I owe so much to my wife, Beverley, and family, sons Ross, Sam, Joe and Sam and Beverly have been married for 51 'wonderful years' to which Sam adds, "She has truly been my driving force." Sam's parents were hard working Italian immigrants who provided him the opportunity to attend Assumption High School and Assumption University. In that same year, Sam was awarded the OHL's Bill Long Award for Distinguished Service in recognition and appreciation of an individual who made an outstanding contribution to the Ontario Hockey League.

Sam's officiating career began in 1958, realizing then that his future was as a referee, not as a player. He said, "I wasn't very adept at playing the game and I quickly realized that if I wanted to keep active in hockey, I'd have to become an official. I started doing minor hockey and senior league games in the Windsor area before joining the OHL staff in 1960." Within a year, he was working the lines in the IHL and became an IHL referee in 1963, a position he held for 17 years before retiring. His enthusiasm for refereeing grew as he would get a kick out of seeing guys out on the ice whom he knew would be officials someday. Noted Assumption hockey coach, Fr. Ron Cullen, always praised Sam's officiating of High School hockey games. As an athlete in the early 60s, Sam Sisco had played Junior B hockey for the Blenheim Bobcats and played one season for the Senior A Windsor Bulldogs. He was a fastball pitcher and lead a local squad to two All-Ontario titles. Later, he and Medo Martinello '53, would be the first local referees to ever officiate in the NCAA.

He credits such people as Harvey Teno, Mickey Brenner, Ron McNamara, Harold Pierre and Skeets Henderson with nurturing his love of officiating over the years. Sam stated that the late Fred Blackburn was the best mentor he had during his officiating career.

The high point of his officiating came after he retired from refereeing in 1990 when the Italian Ice Hockey Federation invited him to conduct a clinic for that country's officials: "I felt it was a tremendous honour and my wife Beverley and I had a wonderful He participated in many other clinics over the years, including one held at the Centre for Excellence, based in Toronto's Hockey Hall of Fame, as part of an ongoing hockey development program which featured a referee's clinic by the NHL/OHL supervisor, Sam Sisco. In 1975, he served as instructor in the National Referee Certification Program; every game came with a rating sheet for referees and linesmen, followed by consultations with each official in post-game appraisals. Attitude, skating, positioning, game control, reaction under stress, were the criteria but particularly having 'a feel for the game', i.e. 'Does the official call a marginal penalty at a crucial point of the game? Does he hand out a good penalty when things are getting hot to keep control of the game?

John McCauley, the Director of Officials of the NHL, hired Sam to work with NHL referee trainees working in the International Hockey League and the Ontario Hockey League. Evaluation at this level was much more detailed. "It's a kick . . . working with Mark Pare and Jerry Pateman (officials in the NHL)"; he also worked with Bill McCreary, another colleague official. His enthusiasm for the job paid dividends. He said, "You have to love the job . . . because it can be intimidating to a young official." The potential in the job for a difficult night's work was very real and he quoted Art Skov, NHL referee, "You've got to be a little thick between the ears." He recruited many in the Windsor area from the midget and high school ranks, particularly at a time when the Windsor and District Hockey Referees Association faced a shortage of older officials to work men's leagues and senior games. This was also during his tenure as executive director of WDHRA, a post which he held for 15 years. By 1990, with more than three decades of refereeing experience, numerous rule changes, different styles of play, improved equipment, the job of officiating was more demanding, as well as working more games and providing tighter supervision. Instant replays to settle disputes he saw as a bane to the game as the human error factor is part of the game. By 2005, Sam saw the need to explain new rules to the Windsor Spitfires during their exhibition play to help them see the opportunity to free up the skill players in the game and to keep the game from deteriorating.

Windsor Star reporter Jim Parker said that while Sam's career spanned several decades, he always remained a teacher. Whether it was coaching high school for three decades or serving as a supervisor of officials from the NHL to the OHL or making calls on the ice, he was always striving to get the best out of others. Sam saw all the people in the City of Windsor that had done so much for athletics that "... I feel honoured."

As his refereeing career evolved, Sam kept his perspective, teaching career was my most important profession," he said. coached the Herman Green Griffins to a pair of WSSA finals and the team featured a pair of future NHLers in Rick Kehoe and Tommy Williams. This attitude carried over into officiating; part of enjoying the job and having received so much help on the ice "... I wanted to give back help to officials to help them get to the next level. While trying to teach young referees, Sam had a saying, "You had to step on their shoes without ruining the shine." His advice to any aspiring official is to remember you're an arbitrator, not an instigator. At the level of official with whom he was working, he considered himself a coach.

One of the major traits in a good official, no matter the level, is patience and the ability to remain calm. If you're too fiery and tend to explode, you make a tough situation worse. A thick skin is required to be an official. Sam holds up former NHL referee Andy Van Hellemond as the measuring stick for all officials. "He's the best I've ever seen. He commanded the most respect and was technically sound." By 1997 son Joe, and dad Sam, had teamed up over 20 times, officiating together since Joe had decided to pick up a whistle. Another son, Ross, also began officiating.

While he loved officiating, his first love was teaching. Joe, like his Dad, has taught high school Math, and is now a consultant with the Windsor Essex Catholic District School Board. Joe stated that whenever they got together, at some point, they talked hockey. "I consider officiating an extension of the classroom.

Ross Sisco, also a teacher, attended officials' training camp in 1994 and worked Colonial League contests and IHL games. Like father and brother, refereeing to Ross is a labour of love. In his capacity as supervisor of officials for the hockey leagues, Sam Sisco helped a number of local officials to reach the pinnacle of the game, such as

NHL officials Dan O'Halloran and Mark Pare. Mark acknowledges Sam's impact on his 30-year career. Of his own legacy, Sam will say, ". . . I tried to help along local officials. I always tried to hire as many local guys as possible. In my opinion, that's been my biggest contribution.

Sailing on James Bay and Learning Cree Legends The Hard Way

Rick Dumouchelle and John Ashworth, both members of the class of '74 and a friend embark on a far north sailing adventure.

"Rick's 26 foot trailering sailboat, MAC-A-TAC, has been to many places for cruises of various lengths but she had never been in salt water. Of course, you could go to Florida or the east coast, but that's been done by many. So in August of 2012, after much careful planning, Captain Rick, and crew Dan Harding and myself made a trip to James Bay. Between us, there was 80 years of combined boating/sailing experience and I'm a Regional Commander of the Canadian Power Squadron, so you would think we were well qualified to take on the challenge. Read on and be the judge.

There are no roads in Ontario that lead to James Bay so you travel there on the Quebec side. A road exists because of the James Bay hydroelectric project. You do need a place to launch your boat however. Preferably a nice cement boat ramp and dock. The community of Waskaganish (Cree for Little House) looked like a good spot. A call to their tourism office resulted in "Yes, please come but there is no ramp here. Everyone launches off the gravel beach down at the river but nothing as big as your sailboat". With 20 years of experience launching MAC-A-TAC in many situations, Rick confirmed that if small boats could do it, we can too, with the help of a "4 wheel drive truck" that is.



From Toronto, the trip takes 20 hours of driving but we're not in a hurry and enjoyed camping along the way. The boat was used as the camper while still on the trailer, sleeping done in the cabin. It worked quite well. We stayed in several private campgrounds along the journey. One park in particular, on Lac Matagami, had a beautiful sandy beach that went for 3 km. It was easily as nice as any provincial park in southern Ontario, but located just south of the 50th parallel.

If you look at a map, our destination is almost due north. We drove through Ottawa, then up the Gatineau Valley through Val-d'Or, Quebec and on to Waskaganish. It's a beautiful trip and the weather cooperated nicely. Even though it was early August, there were nights when you could see your breath.

Once you get north of Matagami, you reach the start of the James Bay Road. You're asked to check in here because there is no cell service and only two gas stations for the next 700 km. There are satellite phones provided every 200 km, just in case of bears or breakdowns. As suggested, we

carried lots of extra fuel and emergency supplies.

After stopping at the Waskaganish check point (confirming we hadn't been eaten by bears along the way) we proceed to the municipal offices to meet Raymond, the tourism officer. This is a Cree community of 2500 on the western shore of James Bay at the mouth of the Rupert River (some know it as Fort Rupert). As soon as you arrive, you see that this town is a real success story. New homes, a lodge, an airport, several schools and two rinks, because everybody plays hockey. People are seen mowing their lawns and

working in the garden. There's lots of home and road construction. Of interest, no alcohol is sold in the community (if you're thirsty for that you need to drive about 300 km each way). We learn from Raymond that the Band Council has an effective philosophy of "If you don't work, go to school or take training, you don't get support." You could see the positive effects.

Raymond kindly spent the afternoon showing us around the community and telling us of



the history. The Cree first traded with the English who sailed here via Hudson's Bay. It was the principal trading port for a long, long time. As a result, English is widely spoken but so is Cree and French. He commented that we were the first sailing vessel to visit in about 100 years. We learned later there was a reason for this. The day was capped with moosemeat and sturgeon in the ceremonial hut with the Chiefs of the area who were there for a regional conference. We talked about our plans and invited any local knowledge they might have. We should have noticed then how quickly the topic of conversation changed when they found out we needed 6feet of water depth for safe sailing.

The next day, we rigged MAC-A-TAC in the grocery store parking lot, then continued to the gravel edge of the Rupert River to launch, all went perfectly. We anchored for the night on the river overlooking the town waiting for high tide. The scenery is fantastic. This is a region of big rivers, big waterfalls, big water and pine forest for as far as the eye can

see. An amazing sight!

Heading out the next day under sail gave the locals some unique photo ops but, it became painfully clear that the charts we had were wrong, ... really wrong! The new electronic charts were wrong too. Complicating the issue is the fact that the water is the color of strong 'tea' and totally opaque, so you can't see below the surface. Remarkably, even at high tide, we could see rocks break the surface where there should've been safe water. We proceeded with caution and continuous lookout.

Unfortunately, things got worse. As the breeze freshened, we began hitting on the bottom. Our depth sounder is having fits. Just to complicate matters, later in the day, when the wind really picked up, we broke a spreader. Good emergency manoeuvres and team work got the sails down quickly and avoided losing the mast. We limped back under power to our Waskaganish anchorage for repairs. We'd also suffered significant damage to the tiller. Fortunately, we had tools and parts on board to repair all.



Day two of sailing started out with optimism, thinking we had a better idea of where the safe water was, but ended up worse than the first. Even before the tide went out, we began hitting bottom, a couple of times, quite hard. All this, while we were several nautical miles away from shore. Once again, we retreat to Waskaganish and became aware that we were taking on water. The sailing part of the trip had come to an abrupt end. Many locals came by to wish us a safe journey home as we pulled the boat out.

They felt that our misfortunes came as a result of a local legend. No one is supposed to point at an Island called "Stag Rock". We had used this prominant island as a reference and pointed at it several times. Who knows, perhaps the legend is true. More likely, water diversion for the massive Hydro Quebec project has left these local waters unsailable until properly re-charted.

As we were packing up, a local historian came to the river to greet us. He'd heard there were visitors interested in the community history and he had something to show us. I went to look at the wreck of an 18th century sailing ship. In a way, we had suffered the same fate! I wonder if her crew pointed at Stag Rock too!"

Born in Welland, April 28, 1925 son of Edward and Agatha (Goetz) Stortz. Graduated from Welland High and Vocational School, (Grade 12) 1942 (was the student Warrant Officer (1st class) heading the Welland Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air

Was a boarding student at Assumption College School (Grade 13) 1943-44 (was the student Warrant Officer (1st class) heading the Assumption Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets.)

Entered the Basilian Fathers Novitiate (Tweedsmuir Ave.) 1944. First vows Aug. 15, 1945. Graduated from the University of Toronto 1945-1948.

Taught at Catholic Central (Detroit) 1948 - 49 - coached junior football

Taught at St. Thomas High School (Houston) 1949 - 50 - took 1st year Theology. Coached junior football, baseball and basketball.

Attended Toronto Teachers' College 1950. Theology classes 1951 - 1953. Was ordained June 29, 1953 (with 16 others)

4th year Theology & Teaching at St. Michael's College School, (Toronto) 1953-54

St. Paul's High School (Saskatoon) 1954 -

1958 (Athletic director and Science Head) coached Senior football and bantam hockey -(Provincial Championship) Elected President of the Saskatoon Playground Hockey



Jerome Brannagan '74 Retires from Windsor Police Force

Saying he 'wholeheartedly' supports the new direction the Windsor Police Services board has plotted for the department, Deputy Chief Jerome Brannagan announced his retirement after 33 years on the job.

"A new day is dawning, as they say," Brannagan told a news conference in the packed foyer of police headquarters. said he leaves a job he loved with 'no regrets whatsoever'.

Brannagan's announcement came the day before the police board was set to announce a new chief, heralding what Mayor Eddie Francis described as a 'cultural change' coming to the force.

"Jerome has always personified what is good about the Windsor Police Service," said Francis, who is also police board chairman.

Brannagan, 56, said he did not apply for the chief 's position, which became vacant last December with the retirement of then-chief Gary Smith amid internal turmoil.

The police board announced that acting police Chief Al Frederick had been named to replace Smith. Francis said Brannagan will assist in the coming transition period and that his departure won't be until early in the new year. Over his long career, "there have been some really bad days ... but they don't outshine the good," said Brannagan. He knew he wanted to be a cop "from the time I could breathe."

Sitting next to him among a crowd of relatives, fellow senior officers, politicians and other members of the justice system was his father, former city police Insp. Fred Brannagan, who retired four years after Jerome was hired as a constable in 1980.

The Windsor-born Brannagan held a variety of positions during his rise within the ranks. After close to 20 years 'chasing the bad guys', including a stint as sergeant in the tactical unit, he was promoted to staff sergeant in charge of special services in 1997. He became inspector in 2002, superintendent in 2006 and deputy chief in 2008, the year he was one of four candidates, including Smith and Frederick, for the chief 's spot vacated by the retiring Glenn Stannard.

Policing, Brannagan said Wednesday, "is a calling, a very noble profession." Noting that 189 police officers had given their lives across Canada in the line of duty during his 33 years in uniform, he said it can also be "a very dangerous job.

He said his worst day on the job was when Const. John Atkinson was shot and killed in the street after interrupting an illegal drug transaction in 2006.

One of the most satisfying days, he added, was when he heard a former burglar on a radio call-in show crediting the words of a younger Brannagan for having helped steer him clear from further criminal activity.

"We do incredible things here every day ... sometimes under the most trying of circumstances," Brannagan said.

Brannagan has served on many community boards and organizations, including the Sexual Assault Crisis Centre, the Children's Achievement Centre, the race and ethno-cultural committee, Downtown Windsor BIA and the sex-offender task force.

He served on the board of the Windsor Police Association from 1986 to

Asked about the biggest change he's seen within the department over his three decades, Brannagan replied: "Transparency and accountability ... and that's a good thing.

The father of three adult children, Brannagan, who spent many years coaching minor baseball and hockey, became a grandfather for the first time. He said he has no plans for after he leaves his 'second family', and that he won't be taking on another job.

Laura Limarzi, class of 2012 volunteers abroad

"This past semester, I had the great honour of spending three and a half months volunteering in Malawi, Africa with the organization 'Determined to Develop'. With the support of my University (U of North Carolina), I have taken an academic gap year that will be comprised mainly of community service both in Africa and in Windsor. 'Determined to Develop' works to alleviate some of the burdens of poverty on the communities of Sangilo, Khwawa and Bundi through various social projects. The biggest lesson



social projects. The biggest lesson live learned in my experiences volunteering abroad is that even in the midst of extreme poverty, people have beautiful views of the world. Here is one my favourite stories from my time in Malawi.

Our story is about a girl named Jessie. Jessie is 15 years old, an orphan and is HIV positive. One day, while we were walking to the hospital to get painkillers for her ankle, she told me that she wants to continue her education so she can help other orphans. A completely selfless goal. Jessie and her siblings, who are also HIV positive, live with their elderly grandmother who struggles to take care of them. A few days later, she distributed a doctor who diagnosed her with programming said that the pagin in visited a doctor who diagnosed her with pneumonia, said that the pain in her leg was an infection contracted because of HIV, and when he ran a few tests, her results came back alarmingly low. That was very frightening to hear, as you can imagine. Though Jessie's condition was not improving and she was in a lot of pain, she was determined to continue on as normal. Jessie has a wonderful sense of humour and an infectious laugh! The day came to say goodbye and we were walking to the road with our arms around each other; when I made a joke about how difficult it was to give her a hug because she is so tall, she responded, "Yes, I am very tall. Tall like a tree, because God has given me so many blessings."

I hope you find some piece of happiness in this story, and I hope that it will serve as a reminder to look on the bright side of things, even when you have every reason to look down. I hope your life will fill you with many blessings so you may also feel, 'tall like a tree'."

One of Windsor's 'one-of-a-kind' high school teachers is retiring after 37 years in the classroom.

Long-time law and business teacher Norm Innocente of Brennan high school (formerly of Assumption) has become known throughout the community for his unique approach to bringing in high-profile lawyers, police officers and even former criminals to his classroom over the years to speak with his students. Innocente credited former Assumption student Pam Adkin '84, whose father was police Staff Sgt. Jim Adkin who was the first to visit his class long ago and triggered the recognition how high-profile visits impacted students in his law classes. Adkin later became Windsor's police chief. "He came



in and talked about a police officer's power of arrest and search," he said. "I knew then the importance of inviting guest speakers to give my students a better idea of the expertise in our community."

One of the most memorable occurrences in Innocente's classroom took place in April, 1997, when he brought together for the first time the family of Ryan Marcuzzi and the Michigan driver who struck her 15 months earlier in a tragic accident that cost the 17-year-old her life as she attempted to board her school bus on Highway 3.

life as she attempted to board her school bus on Highway 3. Accompanied by his local lawyer Pat Ducharme (class of 1968), the 56-year-old Gerrit Alberts emotionally described the incident to about 100 of Innocente's students as a "debt I cannot repay" and admitted full responsibility by saying he was preoccupied when he drove through the flashing lights of the school bus. The incident led to the dogged pursuit by former long-time Chatham-Kent MPP Pat Hoy to get his school bus safety bill approved at Queens Park. It finally became law in 2004 and allowed the police to charge both the driver and the owner of the vehicle that illegally passes a school bus. Another memorable visit was by current Windsor Police Staff Sgt. William Donnelly, then a member of the department's forensic branch, who detailed in Innocente's classroom in the late 1990s how police can use fly larvae to learn the identity and cause of death of a branch, who detailed in Innocente's classroom in the late 1990s how police can use fly larvae to learn the identity and cause of death of a decomposing body. In May, 2005, Innocente invited a drunk driver who killed two people, to Brennan. Christopher Agres, 24, detailed to over 200 students at the school how he twice rejected his girlfriend's offer to instead ride in her car. When he left a local bar with his girlfriend, "She looked at me right in the eye and said, 'Are you OK? Are you OK to drive?' And I looked right back at her and I said, 'Yes, I'm fine."

The ensuing E.C. Row Expressway crash in his own vehicle a year before ended up claiming the lives of two people.

The outgoing law teacher through the years has often been seen hanging around local courthouses, sitting in on various trials and proceedings as time allowed. Others to visit his classroom included a convicted murderer from St. Leonard's House, plus judges Lloyd Dean, Saul Nosanchuk and Steven Rogin. Along with Ducharme, other local criminal lawyers to visit Innocente's class included Lisa Carnelos (class of 1984), Linda McCurdy and Maria Carroccia. Several Crown attorneys also visited including Liz Brown, Frank Schwalm, Tom Meehan and Gary Nikota. One of the Brennan teacher's primary passions has been to support the local Crimestoppers program whose leader, the now retired Ken Koekstat. Crimestoppers program whose leader, the now retired Ken Koekstat, was also a frequent guest in his classroom. Those visits often riggered tips from students on various crimes, Innocente said. Editor's Note: Norm received an award recognizing his 37-year career teaching law to high school students in Windsor. He was given the Ontario Justice Education Network's 2012 Hux-Kiteley Exemplary Justice Educators Award on Aug. 28, 2012. Norm taught Business and Law at Assumption from 1979-1990.

Sister Helen Petrimoulx has helped so many refugees, her name and Windsor address are known among the desperate in different countries in Africa. Now the Windsor advocate against human trafficking, who was a lifeline for hundreds and perhaps thousands of refugees, has been recognized with both the Order of Ontario award and Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal. The Windsor nun's compassion and hard work on behalf of refugees fleeing danger was by its very nature confidential but it is right that it is now being recognized, Rosemary Halford, a Refugees who may

have been raped or watched their relatives die arrive emotionally scarred to a country and system they know little about. "The first thing Helen did was give the young woman a hug and say 'Welcome to Canada. Now we'll sort some things out," Halford said. "The government paperwork is enormous and it's expensive." Petrimoulx is a Holy Names Sister who was the director of the diocese of London Ministry to Refugee Claimants in the Windsor refugee office until she retired in June 2012.

She helped women from the Congo who had been raped, receive both the immigration and psychological care they needed to start their lives in Canada. Psychologists were willing to work pro bono and she established a transition house for refugees. She persevered through years and seemingly endless paperwork to reunite families. About eight years ago she helped start the Windsor Essex County action group against human trafficking in Canada.

Petrimoulx said her passion for the marginalized grew when she was teaching religion at Assumption (1982-1986) and Holy Names high schools and added social justice themes to the courses. She went on to train to be an interfaith hospital chaplain but switched to working with refugee claimants when that job opened up more than 15 years ago.

Petrimoulx was one of 25 people receiving the Order of Ontario, the province's highest honour, in Toronto on Feb. 6th, 2013.

Assumption has done it again!



For more than ten years, the Sabre Bytes Team 772 from Sandwich Secondary School have been participating in FIRST Robotics competitions throughout Canada and the United States. Early in September of 2012, they set up an impressive display at Devonshire Mall in front of The Bay and demonstrated their 2012 robot. The team actively began recruiting other high schools to promote participation in this impressive global competition within the Windsor and Essex County. **Assumption** answered the call along with St. Anne High School and Maranatha Christian Academy.

By December, a student-led workshop for the rookie teams was held at the Centre for Engineering Innovation at the University of Windsor. Information on all sections of team-building was provided and it was evident that all students who participated in this extra-curricular event will grow in their knowledge of science, technology, engineering, and math plus learn the fundamentals of 'how to' run a business. The FIRST team governance model resembles a small business model encouraging leadership, collaboration and participation in the areas of mechanical, electrical programming, public relations and communication.

As a bit of history, the FIRST Robotics Competition began in 1987 in New Hampshire, USA with 20 teams and a handful of students. Today, this non-profit program is responsible for coordinating over 45,000 teams from around the world. A common problem is provided to all teams in a six-week time-frame using a standard 'kit of parts' and a common set of rules. Robots are built from the basic parts found in the kits along



with added features from their own design. When finished, teams bring their robots to compete in games designed by founders Dean Kamen, Dr. Woodie Flowers (physicist and MIT professor Emeritus), and a committee of engineers and other professionals. Participation and involvement will help prepare high school students for the real world.

Mark Gillis, Technological Studies Department Head and the Teacher Advisor for the Assumption Purple Raider Team # 4716 began promoting student involvement early in the school year. By January 2013 over 30 students attended after school sessions and over a six-week period their own robot took shape. In March, their 'defensive' robot was bagged, tagged and ready for the fierce competition in the regional competition being held at the Hershey Center in Mississauga from March 28th – March 30th, 2013.

Suzanne DeFroy, the Teacher Mentor and Team Coordinator brought news of the exciting new adventure to a meeting of the Alumni Association to promote awareness of this project. She said, "So many Assumption Alumni are still committed to the vision of teaching goodness, discipline and knowledge and we as current teachers would appreciate support in the form of expertise and connecting us to the wider business community. We could really use your help to gain another foothold into the future of technology here in the Windsor-Essex community". An e-mail was also sent out to the alumni community and she is pleased to say that the response has been amazing. Look forward to a follow up report once the competition has taken place. Assumption Holds Its' 2nd Annual Gr. 8 Math Invitational

Students at St. Joseph Catholic Elementary school took first place among the 26 teams competing in the Annual Assumption College Catholic High School Math Invitational. Assumption, who has hundreds of students writing Math contests each year had a chance to introduce the fun and fame of being a 'Mathlete' to grade eight students. "It's encouraging to hear that Math and Debate rival football and cross country as the largest teams at Assumption".

This Grade 8 event hosted 130 students comprising 26 teams from 17 schools and all three local school boards were represented. There's no place like home, There's no place like home...

This may be a trite and overused phrase from The Wizard of Oz, but it really struck home for me recently. After twenty-eight years of teaching, I was contemplating retirement and I was taking a semester off to see if I was ready. I knew I wanted to stay involved in dealing with young people—specifically the coaching of basketball that I'd been doing for almost three decades—but I wasn't sure where. I'd taken the previous year off from coaching at my home school, Villanova, and now all the basketball-coaching positions were full there.

Then it dawned on me that if there was ever an opportunity to coach again at ACS, I'd jump at that chance. I had previously taught and coached at my alma mater for sixteen great years along with playing for five years - and the thought of going back and coaching where I'd learned about Goodness, Discipline and Knowledge excited me. A quick phone call was made to Denise Hebert - former ACS student and now Athletic Director at Assumption - and sure enough I'd hit the jackpot. With retirements and teacher movement, several coaching positions were available and I immediately latched on to the opportunity to take the Senior Girls team - their season was in the fall when I'd be off for the semester and as a bonus I was informed that they were a mature, veteran team with some highly skilled players. As an added bonus, two assistant coaches soon joined the program. Mr. Dave Lennie, who works at the Board Offices attached to ACS, was a great addition. He had excellent basketball knowledge, was enthusiastic and extremely responsible - often leaving work to come to practice and then going back to work. Mr. Darren Gravalese, a current ACS teacher, also wanted to help. Mr. Gravalese brought with him a willingness to learn the ropes of coaching basketball, a solid commitment to the team, and a great sense of humour that was enjoyed by both the players and his

As for the players, what can I say?! They were Purple Raiders through and through. As a group they loved their school as thousands of Purple Raiders before them. And as promised, they were a mature and fun group to work with and from the first practice on they never, ever stopped giving their best effort. With the rallying cry of "Raiders - You Know" they took great pride in representing themselves and the school with integrity, class, and commitment to the team and their schoolwork. In fact, twice during the season, they had to bring me signed forms from their teachers indicating that all was well in their course work - and both times all players diligently returned the forms with glowing accounts. As for the games, we finished with a solid 8-2 regular season record and although we didn't win either of the two tournaments we entered, we did have success in both. We won our first round playoff game convincingly against Cardinal Carter by a score of 60-25, which put us up against the regular season champions from L'Essor who were now 11-0 in league play. L'Essor started off extremely hot from the outside in the semi-final game and we found ourselves down 24-8. Undaunted, the Lady Raiders did what Raiders do when their backs are against the wall - they fought back, and we trimmed the lead to a manageable four points. Unfortunately, as often happens in comebacks, so much energy was used getting back into the game, that we eventually lost 63-50. No doubt, a few tears were shed as the season ended, especially since it was the last high school game for eight of the players. In my last remarks to the team, I emphasized that many teams would have folded after such an early deficit, but as usual, this Raider group never gave up - a

source of pride for both them and me. As for my future, I do intend to retire from teaching at the end of this school year, but my coaching of basketball at ACS will continue. I'm setting a goal for twenty more years—that would make an even five decades of coaching high school basketball. (Please don't tell my wife!) Dorothy sure was right—there's no place like home!!!
