New Health Unit CEO

The new CEO of the Windsor-Essex County Health Unit, **Dr. Ken Blanchette.** Assumption College Catholic HIgh School Alumnus '91

"I wanted to have a greater impact on health-care providers."

Coming to the Windsor-Essex County Health Unit as its new CEO more than two years into the pandemic, Blanchette said there's lots of hard work ahead after COVID-19 "changed everything" the health unit does.

"This opportunity came up and it was just the natural combination of knowledge, leadership experiences and relationships and partnerships,"

Blanchette most recently worked as the executive director at Connex Ontario, which provides health services to people living with mental health and addictions challenges. He attended Assumption High School and the University of Windsor before opening a chiropractic practice in Michigan, eventually returning home to the Windsor region.

"Staff here and everywhere else in health care, we've had a rough time," he said. "They've been working hard and diligently. They move mountains. We have to be mindful of where they are, but we also have to look at the newer folks that are coming in and training them."

Blanchette said he'll also be working with the senior leadership team to make people even more aware of the services the health unit offers, after the pandemic made them synonymous with COVID and vaccines.

"Before COVID, people knew of the health unit, even if you didn't really know exactly what they did," he said. "When the pandemic hit, everybody knew the health unit but it's really affiliated I believe with pandemic and vaccinations".


Blanchette said he's also looking forward to the recently announced partnership with the University of Windsor exploring co-location for the health unit, and the new controlled treatment site that will "save lives."

Remembering Denis Malette





The Alumni Association will be renaming the Catholic Student of the Year Award to the Denis Malette Memorial Catholic Student of the Year Award. This is an annual award given to a student dedicated to their Catholic Faith and to the life of the Assumption High

School Community. This award is valued at \$1000. Denis J Malette passed away on July 12, 2022 at 81 after a long illness. Denis was a special teacher. He molded young students to think critically, discuss important topics and become better persons. He wanted to see students reach their potential. Denis came to Assumption in 1978. I had the privilege of being a student in his class. He brought out the best in all of his students. We are all grateful for that. He was a kind and compassionate person who always gave of his time.

He was always supporting the school teams and was an accomplished team photographer. He was well liked and respected among my fellow students. He was selected by fellow teachers as "Educator of the Year" for 1992-93. After his retirement he was an integral part of the Assumption Alumni Association - writing for the newsletter. As a part of his legacy, an award for an Assumption student will be named in his honour.

Born September 18, 1940, in Wendover, Ontario, near Ottawa, Denis graduated from Corpus Christi High School, Windsor, and from the University of Windsor in 1967.

He served in the Canadian Naval Reserves aboard an ice-vessel in Hudson Bay.

Beginning in the 1970s, Denis taught at St. Clare, Holy Family, and Christ the King elementary schools, and Assumption and Catholic Central high schools.

He served on the Assumption church restoration committee, was a member of the Knights of Columbus Council No. 4386, and Windsor Goodfellows, and generously supported many charities, especially those helping children.

He is survived by sister Regine (Gerard) Dupuis and two brothers, Ghislain (Paul), and Bernard (Michelle), as well as many nieces, nephews, great-nieces and nephews, and great-great nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his parents, Albert and Eugenie, and siblings Jean and Shirley Malette, Pierre, Odette and Gerald Menard, Claude (Rosaline) Malette, and Gilbert and Theresa Malette.

He will be missed and I am grateful to have known him.

Celebrating 200 years of Teaching and Preaching Goodness, Discipline, and Knowledge

The Congregation of St. Basil, also known as the Basilian Fathers, is a Roman Catholic community of priests, students for the priesthood, and lay associates focused on Christian education and evangelization.

It was founded in 1822 when ten diocesan priests defied anticlerical laws passed during the French Revolution to bring balanced Christian education to a small village in southern France by operating a seminary. The founders' devotion to work, involvement in the Church, simplicity of their life, and a call to deeper community life continue to inspire the priests of St. Basil today.

1870 - The Basilian Fathers of Toronto are invited to take charge of Assumption Parish and Assumption College. Father Denis O'Connor, CSB becomes the superior of Assumption College and pastor of Assumption Parish. He goes on to become Bishop of London in 1890 and Archbishop of Toronto in 1899. The Basilian Fathers staff the parish continuously since this time.

1954 - Through an act of the Ontario Legislature, Assumption College was renamed Assumption University of Windsor. The new University accepted the non-denominational Essex College, incorporated in 1954. The new non-denominational University included Assumption University as a federated member holding in abeyance its degree granting powers save for the Faculty of Theology. The facilities and teaching faculty of Assumption University were integrated into the University of Windsor.

1962 - The city of Windsor's growth and the increasing demands for higher education, necessitated a further restructuring of the University. Accordingly, the boards of governors and regents of Assumption University and the board of directors of Essex College petitioned the Government of Ontario for the establishment of the University of Windsor. An Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario incorporated the University of Windsor on December 19, 1962.

1971 - With the merging of St. Mary's Academy, Assumption High School became a co-educational secondary school within the Windsor-Essex Catholic District School Board. The Basilian Fathers continued to live in community at the school.

2006 - The Basilians left the school in 2006.

2013 - The Assumption University building was sold to the University of Windsor. The building was renamed Assumption Hall and Assumption University and the Catholic Campus Ministry department and student lounge continue to be housed on the second floor.

2020 - The parish communities of Our Lady of the Assumption Parish, St. Alphonsus Parish, Saint Benedict Tridentine Rite Community, and Saint Daniel Comboni Community join together to form the Windsor Heritage Catholic Family of Parishes. The Family of Parishes is placed under the leadership of the Basilian Fathers.

ACS Raider Golf Tournaments






Boniferro/Landry Memorial Golf

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Richard Loreto, Class of '67 By: Cris Kohl, '6

It's interesting to see how Assumption Collegiate School graduates have fared since they left high school. Richard Loreto i retired now, but he has had an interesting and varied life an career.

Richard began his post-secondary-school studies at th University of Windsor in September 1968, immediately upo graduating from grade 13 (yes, they had a grade 13 then) at ACS Four years later, he graduated with an Honours B.A. in politica science, and in 1973, he completed work for a Master of Art degree in the same subject. In 1984, he finished all of th requirements at the University of Toronto for his Ph.D. degree in political science and public administration.

Between 1977 and 1990, Richard taught courses o Canadian and Ontario politics, local government, and publi management and policy at Toronto Metropolitan University, the University of Toronto, and Brock University in St. Catharines. He has produced a number of scholarly and popular publications including one essay on the Ontario cabinet that was included i the 1981 book, *The Government and Politics of Ontario*, edited b Donald C. MacDonald, prompting a political book reviewer i Windsor to describe Richard as "local boy made good in Toronto. Richard is the co-editor (along with the late Dr. Trevor Price fron the University of Windsor) of the book, *Urban Policy Issues Canadian Perspectives* (McClelland & Stewart Inc., 1990.)

During his academic career, Richard developed a part-tim consulting practice, but in 1990, he went full-time by forming RA (his initials) Consulting Limited. As a consultant, he managed variety of projects ranging from program evaluation to executiv education for clients at the federal, provincial, and municipal level of government. Richard worked for both employer and unio clients in the construction industry across Canada and in th United States, carrying out labour market analysis and strateg development projects. He also led major strategy developmer projects for clients in the mining, electric power, steel, chemica specialty products, and casualty and property insuranc (contiinued next page) industries.

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Richard's Ph.D. dissertation was on the topic of policing in Ontario, and he was consulted on numerous police matters in Ottawa, Halton, Hamilton, and Waterloo, including consultation for the selection of an Ottawa police chief. He lectured on management topics at the Ontario Provincial Police Academy, Ontario Police College, and Canadian Police College. The Hamilton Police Association nominated Richard for the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee medal, which he received in 2012.

His father, Harry Loreto, immigrated to Canada from the Abruzzo Region of Italy at the age of seven in 1930. After service in the Canadian Army during World War II, Harry married Rose Di Minin, and Richard was born in Windsor in 1949. Upon completing his undergraduate studies, Richard married Carol Baleka on August 5, 1972, and before the'70s came to an end, the couple had a son (Michael, today a radiologist in North Bay, ON) and a daughter (Elise, today a physiotherapist in Hamilton, ON). Richard "pulled the plug" on his company and retired in 2019. He and Carol recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.



There is another very important aspect to Richard Loreto that is totally separate, distinct, and different from his professional profile and family life: MUSIC, specifically loud rock and roll MUSIC. It forms the bookends of his life. In the late 1960s, while still a student at Assumption, Richard played lead guitar in a series of local bands, culminating in the early 1970s with the accomplished and significant Windsor group called the Blues Train. Today, retired from his long career, he continues to make himself heard by "bending the strings" in two Ontario bands.
