REDEDICATION OF ASSUMPTION

The re-dedication of Assumption was celebrated on Sunday, November 7th, 2004. Many members of the Assumption Community attended. Graduates, parents, current and former staff members, students, Board Administration and Trustees gathered for Mass in the Armstrong Gym. Father Bill Kornacker, graduate and priest chaplain was the main celebrant. Fathers C. Cullen, G. Beaune, J. Stortz, Q. Johnson, J. Redican and Hathaway concelebrated.

Before Mass, Michael Moher, Director of Education, Janet Ouellette, Superintendent of Education, Patrick Keane, Trustee, Rosemary Limarzi, School Council Chairperson, and Gregory McLean, Architect shared greetings and congratulations. Five former Principals were acknowledged and thanked for their contribution to the building of the Assumption tra-

dition: Father Ron Cullen, Fr. Joe Redican, Joseph Berthiaume, Kevin Mulvey and Frank Marcon. Father Kornacker shared his thoughts about the journey Assumption continues to make commenting that we are always under construction. Father Quentin Johnson spoke of the Basilian charism as it is revealed at Assumption through its openness, flexibility, and perseverance.

Mass opened with a procession of staff and students carrying the crucifixes to be blessed and placed throughout the building. 

Mio and Walker Enter Windsor/Essex Sports Hall of Fame


Eddie Mio, '71 and Bruce Walker, '73 join the likes of Fr. Charles Armstrong, Fr. Ronald Cullen and Reno Bertoia to name a few, in being inducted into the Windsor/Essex Sports Hall of Fame at ceremonies that took place on October 16, 2004. Can you name the other eleven Assumption Alumni Inductees? Answers found somewhere in this newsletter.

Mio helped lead the Assumption Purple Raiders to three consecutive city hockey titles in the late 1968-71. Eddie Mio won a WSSA Championship in 1971 and 1972, nevertheless attended Colorado College on his way to seven years in the NHL.

"Bruce and I didn't only play together at Assumption, we played football and baseball together", said Mio at the induction ceremony.

Eddie was acknowledged for his success in the National Hockey League while **Bruce** was acknowledged for his accomplishments with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian League.

In 1972, **Bruce Walker** played quarterback for the WSSA championships. He played basketball in '72,'73 and in '74. Walker, with his team won the WSSA, SWOSSA <u>and</u> were semi-finalists at the Ontario High School Championships. In '74, he quarterbacked the WSSA Champion Football team. He then became an all-Canadian receiver with the University of Windsor Lancers. After graduating in 1979, Walker played six seasons with the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders.

VERY PROUD

"As anyone up here can tell you, I'm very proud for people to know I'm from Windsor," said Walker, who has lived in Ottawa for over 20 years. "It's quite an honour to be recognized by your hometown. It was a great place for any athlete, who had aspirations of going to the top level, to grow up. There are so many great coaches: Bernie Soulliere, Harry Lumley, Gino Fracas and Father Cullen, available to us."

Walker's accomplishments with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League, along with an impressive high school and college career, were celebrated by a large contingent of relatives and friends.

EXCITED ABOUT THIS ONE!

"I don't really get excited about championships or individual awards, but I am excited about this one," Walker said in a telephone interview from his office as vice-president of sales and marketing for the Ottawa Athletic Club.

Walker said: "It's not often you get a chance to thank all the people who had such an influence on your life."

A STAND-OUT

Walker was a standout in football, baseball and basketball at Assumption under the direction of high school legends like Jack Hool, Ed Petryshyn, Bob Mailloux, Gerry Philp and John Upham.

"I think baseball was a sport I played really well," he said. "Basketball was the sport I enjoyed most and football was the sport I made a career." In a baseball game in Detroit, a Tiger Scout raved about Bruce's prospects to play Major League Baseball. Bruce chose football.

He recalled how Rev. Ronald Cullen would open the Assumption gym and that's where he and

his buddies could be found, shooting hoops at 10 o'clock on a Saturday night.

FOOTBALL!

Walker attended North Dakota State University on a football scholarship for one year but returned in 1975 and began a successful four-year run with the University of Windsor Lancers under coach Gino Fracas. He won an OUAA championship with the Lancers in 1975 and he was a CIAU all-Canadian wide receiver in 1978.

He still counts the decision to come home and play for Fracas as among "one of the best I've ever made. I'm a big proponent that it's beneficial for young athletes to play in their home town. Sometimes, you get caught up in the idea of a U.S. scholarship but it's not the be all and end all."

Walker, 49, played for the Rough Riders from 1979 through 1984, making one appearance in the Grey Cup In 1981.

GIVING BACK

These individuals are giving back to their communities. Eddie co-chairs an annual event that supports the Windsor Make a Wish Foundation. Bruce, in addition to working with physically disabled kids and speaking at over 120 events annually, is also honourary chairman for Ronald McDonald House in the Ottawa area and race director for "Do it for Dad" an event that has raised over a half a million dollars over the past five years for prostate research and care.

FEATURE - JAY EVANS, '90

FROM THE FIELD TO THE BENCH

Two years ago, alone with his thoughts in the Windsor Stars' dugout, designated hitter Jay Evans stared downward toward nothing in particular. He dabbed at the perspiration on his forehead with a towel, but nothing could wipe away the frustration. There is no consolation in a trip to the bronze-medal game.

Only disconsolation. Especially when it's your last chance at glory. "You work all year for the gold medal and, when it's gone, that's kind of tough to take," Evans said.

Windsor's oldest everyday player during last year's Canadian Senior Baseball Championships, Evans, 33, has reached that point in life where his heart and his body wage war for control over his mind.

His physique no longer resembles the lithe mould that earned Evans all-city honours as a high school athlete at Assumption in volleyball, baseball and football.

Finding words to express his disappointment over this scenario was difficult for Evans.

Finding words to express why he still thrives on being part of such scenarios was much easier.

"Games like this," he said. "I still get nervous. I still get excited. I still feel the exhilaration of victory and the pain of defeat."

Driving force

"That's what keeps me playing, even though my body is telling me it's time to go." Boys will be boys, even when they have boys of their own. Evans and his wife **Renee Janisse**, '92, have two sons, Josh, 3 and Jacob, 5. "My wife and my family have been wonderful to me in enabling me to play the game this long," he said. "The juniors won the gold medal and there's four or five of them ready to move up," Evans said. "It's time for younger players to pick up the torch and carry on the tradition of

the Windsor Stars." Baseball has opened up a world of opportunity to Evans. A college education, more than a dozen trips to national championships and the thrill of representing Canada at the 1989 World Championships.

Now, Evans is prepared to give something back.

"I want to coach," he said. "I'd like to work with younger kids. I definitely feel that I have something to offer as a teacher."

This summer, Jay is Head Coach and Manager of the Prestigious 17-18 year old Midget Selects, assisted by **Jim Curtis**, '91.

As Evans packed up his gear for the final time as a player, Josh and Jacob waited patiently at his side.

They don't care whether daddy's team won or lost. They only care that he's daddy.

After Assumption, Jay was assistant coach at Wayne State University, MI for 3 years - hitting, outfield, 1st base coach. He earned his degree in Child Development at Trevecca Nazarene University, Nashville, TN on a baseball scholarship. He was Freshman of the year and was voted All-American.

Jay married Renee Janisse, '92 - the owner of a small cake business named Cakes Etc. on Grand Marais at Dominion.



It was wonderful to see everyone at the reunion. I did not know about the reunion until I talked to Patty Pallisco sometime in the fall. When she told me the dates, I was unsure I could make it because I already had a trip scheduled to Austria for two different meetings. I had more than a full day in between arriving home and having to leave again, so I thought that even with my luck, I would be able to get to Windsor in time even if there were some delays. I had planned to arrive early Friday morning so that I could sleep and deal with jet lag before our class get together Friday evening. It was not to be.

Here we go ...

Before I left home, the airline had changed me to an earlier flight in the morning, On Nov. 3rd, we left on time with clear skies. Because of thick foo in Amsterdam, we were diverted to Dusseldorf, Germany. With about twenty other planes, we sat on the tarmac for over 3 hours. When we finally arrived in Amsterdam, so did everyone else and the airline did NOT handle it well at all. Needless to say, I did not make my connecting flight. The electronic "take-a number" system was not working and instead of handing out numbers or setting up lines, there was just a mass of humanity pushing towards the counter. It took over four hours to get to the front, only to be told that I could not leave for another 24 hours! During the four hours we stood in line, a half a dozen flights left for the US. The irony is that had I been on my original flight there would have been no delay because by that time the fog had lifted. When I reached the front of the line, I learned the reason for this unusual, very dense fog. Apparently, a few days earlier there was a volcanic eruption in Iceland, an underwater eruption, no less and it was wreaking havoc with weather all over Northern Europe.

Houston, we have a problem

Rather than stand in another line for accommodations. I found my own hotel room and I made sure I was the first in line the next morning to get my boarding pass and an aisle seat for the 10 hour flight. I was the first one at the gate. At the time we were supposed to board, nothing happened and I kept waiting and waiting, until finally, an airline representative informed us that the flight was not cancelled BUT there was a problem with the sliding mechanism of one of the doors and FAA regulations stated that the 60 seats surrounding this door had to remain vacant. Yes, you guessed it. One of those seats was mine. Unfortunately, many of the seats affected were in Business Class so those passengers were taken care of first, so by the time it came around to me, the only seat available was in the center of a row of five.

"I was not a happy camper."

I told the attendant that at least they could have given preference to the people who had been stranded there the day before. She said there were more than a hundred of us on that flight. I replied that not all were in one of the 60 seats. She said they had no way of knowing who these people were. I told her that we would be more than happy to provide evidence that we had been there over 24 hours! My displeasure must have shown in my face because as I boarded the plane, a very perky flight attendant accosted me, asking if there was anything she could do for me. She said she knew that the delay had been very trying for everyone, but that I looked particularly upset. All I wanted was for everyone to leave me alone so I could just get settled, but when I got to my seat, there was no room for my carry on necessitating another walk up the aisle.

Sparks flying

I must have had sparks flying from my eyes because when I sat down, the couple on my right asked me if I was okay; the couple on the left wanted to know if there was anything they could do for me. I had to reassure them all that in a few minutes, I would be just fine and that I would not bite their heads off or destroy their trip. We left Amsterdam four hours late. I was ready to kiss the ground when I arrived home, but I didn't have time. I arrived home 36 hours later than I was supposed to and the first leg of my flight to Windsor was a mere 2 hours later. I knew there was no way I could get home and back in time for the flight, so I came home, unpacked, repacked and did laundry while I made phone calls and searched the internet for other options. I slept for two hours before going back to the airport for a 6 am flight to Las Vegas.

Party Central

No chance for sleep there. I had Party Central on my plane. How can people drink alcohol at 6 AM??? From Las Vegas to Detroit, I had to go on standby. The first flight left at 9 am. Of course, I did not get onto that flight, but the agent at the counter next door heard me talking about Amsterdam and asked me if I wanted to go there. I practically screamed, "NO!" and begged him not to send me back there. When I told him I was trying to get to Detroit, he told me I could take his flight to Minneapolis and there was a connection to Detroit that would get me there sooner than if I waited for the next direct flight. Once he assured me I did not have to be on standby in Minneapolis, I took it. No problem.. ..until it was time for the flight to leave from Minneapolis. Apparently, someone noticed a faulty tire during the routine pre-flight check.

More delay!

No problem. I'm glad someone noticed before we tried to land. Well, then we get the announcement that there will be a further delay because someone brought up the wrong size tires. I arrived in Detroit Friday night 13 hours later than I was supposed to. I wish I could say that was the end of it. I rented my car and headed out to the freeway to get to the bridge. I am very familiar with Detroit, but two freeways under construction with multiple detours, at night, with little to no sleep; of course it took me longer than it should have. I presented myself, exhausted, at the check in counter at the Hilton, just longing for a shower and a bed. She told me the original room was not available because it was "out of order". (What does that mean???). I said I didn't care as long as the room was non-smoking. She assured me that it was. When I got to the room, it was actually a business suite with a big conference table and clearly a smoking room i.e. ashtrays everywhere, smells like smoke. I figured, "What the heck, I've been up this long."

Not acceptable!

So I trudged back to the desk and told them this room WAS NOT acceptable. This second person explained to me that the first room is "out of order" because it is undergoing some construction. Okay. So I get my new non-smoking room, turn on the heat and jump in the shower. At 10:30, I am ready to fall into bed. Just one more little problem NO HEAT! Cold air was spewing from the wall unit like it was an air conditioner. I turned it off, jumped into bed and into sweet oblivion. (They had to replace the entire unit the next day).

And the moral of my tale of woe is that, in spite everything, I made it to my 25 year reunion and I had a great time! THE END (I hope).




Abigail D. writes to class of '84:

ASSUMPTION STUDENTS STAND SECOND TO NONE: I am the mother of a son and daughter who graduated from Assumption College Catholic School and I feel compelled to respond to Kevin Fader's attack on their alma mater.

Had Mr. Fader been interested, he might have attended our monthly PTA meetings and seen the spirit of Assumption and learned of the dedication of the teachers, administration and support staff firsthand.

My husband and I held positions on the council over six years. It is true, that in many ways, the Assumption of today is a memory of its former self. The enrolment has dropped as the community at large shamefully denigrates it as a west-side school, and not as the birthplace of Catholic education in southwestern Ontario.

And under the leadership of the administration, Assumption will be the first publicly funded secondary school in southwestern Ontario to offer the International Baccalaureate program, a higher standard of learning that will be a benefit to all of Windsor.

As for ACS being located in the most polluted part of the city, his opinion stated is an unproven fact, I await Mr. Fader's calls to close and relocate the University of Windsor, whose students breathe the same air only a football field away.



He was born and raised in Windsor Ontario and played for the Assumption High School Purple Raiders in football and basketball. In 1948 he was named to the first team all city in both sports making him one of only two athletes to accomplish that feat in the same season. Following high school he played football under head coach Frank DeMarco at Assumption College in 1950 in the junior ORFU league.

During the 1950's he played short stop with Windsor Sterlings. In 1951 he played semi-pro baseball in Sudbury for the Frood Tigers with football team mates Gino Fracas, '48 and the late Joe Schiller, '48.

In 1951-52 Bill was top scorer on the University of Western Ontario Canadian University Basketball Champions. In 1952, Bill played in the Helsinki Olympics with the Tillsonburg basketball team. In 1953 he came to Sarnia and played one season for the legendary Sarnia Imperials football team. Then, for 33 years he taught, coached, and was a vice principal and principal in Lambton County at the secondary school level. He retired in 1986 as principal of Alexander MacKenzie High School. Bill was always regarded highly as an educator and athlete. Throughout his career he was an outstanding and talented athlete in basketball,

baseball and football and was truly a "Hall of Famer".

Many lives have been touched by Bill in a positive way. Bill and his loving wife Joan celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in May, 2004 with their five daughters and spouses and their 10 grandchildren. At that time his 5 daughters inducted him into their own personal "Hall of Fame" as a fitting tribute to his many successful athletic endeavors. Charles Weston, a former Windsor deputy police chief and a Second World War veteran, died Friday, Oct. 22, 2004, following a lengthy illness. He was 83.

A police officer with 35 years' service, he worked in all areas of the department and retired in 1960 after six years as deputy chief. A husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather, he and his wife Joan had celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last November.

Their family includes four daughters, two sons, nine grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

"He was a very hard working, proud man," Leslea Trudell, a granddaughter, said of her grandfather's pride for his family, work and community.

"He put a lot of dignity behind his work," she said.

His other family, the police department talked at length about honour, too, and how much they had felt serving him.

"He was very special to us," Roger Mortimore, Windsor police deputy chief, said Friday.

"He did everything he could in his career," Mortimore added.

Born in Windsor, the former deputy chief went to Assumption College School.

The measure reflected his "fairness and concern" for the rank and file, Mortimer added.

lan Chippet, '62, a retired police inspector with 30 years' of service, said Weston was a "great boss and leader" who was outgoing, professional and disciplined.

"He brought me up in a good way. He took his job and profession seriously".

Chippett recalled Weston's dedication to community service, adding that he seemed to enjoy every minute of his life.

"He tried to do his best all the time. That's how I'll remember him."

His volunteer commitment included work with the Goodfellows organization which distributes food baskets to people in need.

"He didn't retire," Mortimore said.

Charles retired from the Windsor Police Force as Deputy Chief of Police.

He was a veteran of WWII having served with the Windsor-Essex Scottish Regiment. He was a life member of the Knights of Columbus, Council #1453 and the Dean Wagner Assembly, Gvzera Caravan of the Order of Alhambra, a 50 year member of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch #255, Past-President of the Windsor Police and Police Pensioners Associations, Past-President of St. Theresa Parish Advisory Board and K of C Minstralaires. Charles also volunteered his time and generosity to numerous associations and charitable organizations. Charles was a loyal Detroit Red Wing Fan.
