# International Baccalaureate student Victoria Cope will major in international studies next year at an American university.

Victoria Cope is headed off to Ohio next year with a great university scholarship, but she might never have received the offer if she'd chosen to go to a soccer practice on a fateful night back in Grade 8.

While still a student at St. Rose Catholic Elementary School, she was encouraged by a friend to attend an information night about the International Baccalaureate program at Assumption College Catholic High School.

"I didn't really want to go

because I didn't want to miss soccer practice," she said. As it turns out, going to that meeting might have been the best decision she's ever made. Now in her fourth year of the IB program, the Grade 12 student says it's where she really found herself.

"You really learn who you are as a person," Cope said of the program.

Founded in 1968, the IB program currently operates in almost 4,000 schools in 147 countries, offering challenging programs to more than 1.2 million students. Schools interested in becoming IB World Schools must successfully complete a rigorous authorization process, which typically takes about two to three years.

Now in its tenth year at Assumption, there are around 300 students – about half the school's enrolment – in the IB program. About 110 of those students are in Grade 9, making it the largest IB class ever according to Joseph Ibrahim, the school's principal.

Cope, who will major in International Studies next year, said the

reason so many students succeed is because of the atmosphere created by the program's teachers.

"Every single teacher at Assumption is there to help you," she said. "They're always available and there for extra help and support. They understand the value of the program. They're there to see us succeed."

Looking back, Cope said she has not regrets about skipping that soccer practice.

It has lived up to everything they said it would be," she said of the IB program, adding that it provided her with a wealth of knowledge in the areas of time management, coping with stress and critical analysis. "You do make a lot of sacrifices, but it's a lifestyle choice more than anything else. Of course the workload is heavier, but if you enjoy learning, it's nothing you can't handle.

## **Deputy Chief John Pare Named Next Chief of Police**

The London Police Services Board is pleased to announce the appointment of John Pare as London's next Chief of Police, replacing retiring Chief, Bradley Duncan, effective May 2, 2015.

Chief-Designate John Pare began his policing career with the LaSalle Police Service in 1987. His career with the London Police Service, where he is now a 26-year veteran, began as a cadet recruit in 1989. He has worked in Uniformed Patrol and Major Crime Section, and has held management positions in Professional Standards Branch, Human Resources Branch, Community Policing Branch and Corporate Services Division. John was promoted to Deputy Chief in January of 2012 and has served as both the Deputy Chief of Administration and the Deputy Chief of Operations.

Chief-Designate Pare is a member of the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP) Justice Committee and sits as Chair of the OACP Mental Health Working Group. In this role, Chief-Designate Pare has been called on by the OACP Executive to respond to mental health and addiction issues and the impact on policing.

In addition to numerous policerelated courses, Chief-Designate Pare is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and has a certificate from Dalhousie University Police Leadership – Administration Program.

Chief-Designate Pare is a recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal.

Chair Jeannette Eberhard noted, "John brings to the position of Chief of Police nearly 28 years of knowledge and experience, a strong work ethic, ambition and a deep passion for this community and the London Police Service organization. The Board welcomes John to his new leadership role and looks forward to working together with him and all members of the London Police Service in protecting the safety and quality of life of all Londoners."

Mayor Matt Brown added, "Chief Designate John Pare brings a wealth of experience and keen insight to his new role. Experience and insight that will serve Londoners well in the years ahead," and "I look forward to working with Chief Designate Pare as we continue to build a community that is inclusive, welcoming and safe. We are in good hands."

John resides in London with his wife Lee Ann. They have 2 adult children and one grandchild residing in British Columbia.

More details will be forthcoming related to a May 4, 2015 Change of Command Ceremony to be held at the Four Points Sheraton in London.

# IPFW promotes Ryan "Rock" Perrotte to *Head Coach*

**FORT WAYNE, Ind**. – IPFW Director of Athletics <u>Kelley Hartley Hutton</u> has announced that longtime IPFW assistant coach Ryan "Rock" Perrotte has been tabbed as the second head coach in IPFW men's volleyball program history.

"I am extremely grateful to Chancellor Vicky Carwein, Athletic Director <u>Kelley Hartley Hutton</u>, Coach Arnie Ball, the IPFW volleyball community, alumni, and current players for giving me the opportunity to guide the IPFW men's volleyball program," said Perrotte. "I am so humbled and honored to have the opportunity to lead this program, and to work with such an incredible group of student-athletes."

Perrotte has spent the last 12 seasons as an assistant coach with the IPFW men's volleyball program, and has helped lead the team to the 2007 National Title game, two NCAA Final Four appearances, and two MIVA Championships. He has coached three All -Americans and 18 All-MIVA selections.

"We are extremely excited about Rock being our next men's volleyball coach," said Hartley Hutton. "His deep understanding of the men's volleyball program and its inner-workings, along with his solid work ethic, will allow him to build upon the strong history of this program."

Perrotte takes the reigns of the program from volleyball coaching legend Arnie Ball, who will retire at the end of June with over 500 career men's volleyball victories to his credit.

"I cannot express in words what Coach Ball has done for me throughout my tenure as a player and his assistant coach here at IPFW," said Perrotte. "I am so thankful for his support and mentorship during this process, and over the last two decades. I would not be where I am today without Coach Ball being such an incredible influence in my volleyball career. I am honored to have played, coached, and learned from one of the greatest people in the history of college volleyball."

An alumnus of the volleyball program, Perrotte was named Second Team All-MIVA as a senior, helping the team to a 23-4 overall record, a MIVA Championship, and an appearance at the NCAA Final Four.



# Stirring Images from the First Ever Illustrated Version of Toni Morrison's 'Beloved'

Toni Morrison's Beloved is widely considered the greatest of all American novels published in last quarter of the 20th century, but, until now, it has never been released as an illustrated edition — this despite the effortless magic with which Morrison invokes (or provokes) her images of post bellum black life. Thankfully, The Folio Society has now released a moving, brilliantly illustrated version of Beloved, complete with an introduction by Russell Banks. Morrison chose Banks to write about the novel, and she also selected the novel's gifted illustrator, Joe Morse, whose work you can see below. Flavor wire talked with Mr. Morse about his approach illustrating Morrison's masterpiece.

FW: The project obviously comes from a deep respect and admiration both for Beloved and Toni Morrison's broader oeuvre. Can you talk about your relationship to her work and how this project came about?

JM: There are images you make sometimes that become an important leap forward. In January of 1998, I illustrated a Washington Post book review of Toni Morrison's Paradise. Her writing resonated with me as a visual artist. As she said in an interview, "The author's job is to make spaces for the reader to enter." And through the image I made, in response to her words, I came to see that as one of my goals in making art.

When I was contacted by The Folio Society in early 2014 to illustrate Beloved, I truly had to read the email twice. I have worked on many major projects during my career, but this was beyond belief. My UK agent Kit Killington at Killington Arts had presented my work to FS in the past, and, recently, I have worked on more book projects.

But there was one little matter first... I was told that I needed to create an image for Ms. Morrison's approval to move forward as the artist to work on the book. I had read Beloved in the past, so I read it again and again. I researched the time period, developed character sketches, noted passages that I could visualize, and I decided on an image that, after the acceptance of Toni Morrison, is now the frontispiece of the illustrated edition of Beloved.

FW: I love the way Folio titles the illustrations with short passages from the text. How do you go about choosing the scenes you would like to illustrate?

JM: When I work with a text, I look for the visual images embedded in the words that will support the narrative. I try to build a thread from image to image so that they belong together with the text, rather than appear dropped in like candy. But then there is Beloved: a story based on fact, spun through with history, poetry, horror, love, loss, and a ghost. It can be read on so many levels: how was I supposed to express it in nine paintings? I looked for the threads a great storyteller leaves for the reader, and where they converge to be woven together. There are also beautifully written visual passages in Beloved that should remain in the reader's imagination and not be defined by my brush.

My work is figurative and graphic, with the gesture or form of the body creating it's own physical typography and message. In the book, the characters are shaped by their personal histories and their overlapping relationship to the central figure of Sethe. It soon became clear to me that the images should focus on the strength I could bring to the project, expressing characters at the point when everything changes for them, as they drive or are driven by the narrative.
